The Changing Color of Frogs.

Frogs, whether blind or not, become dark green or black if they are kept in a dark vessel in a sparingly-lighted room, but when a branch with green leaves is introduced into the vessel, they all recover their bright green color. In some way unknown the reflected green light acts either upon the nerves of the skin, or—what seems more probable, if Steinach's experiments are taken into account—directly upon the pigment cells. Moreover, the sensations derived from the toes have also an influence upon the changes of color. When the bottom of the vessel is covered with a felt or with a thin wire net, the frogs also become black, recovering their green color when a green branch is introduced into the vessel.
