The fullest answer that science can yet give to the three most interesting questions, perhaps ever asked in the world, are explained in an interesting article in the December Forum, by Dr. Daniel G. During the eleven years in which an income tax was imposed in this country as an unavoidable war measure the amount collected averaged a trifle over \$30,000,000 per annum, and in 1888 the tax was paid by only 250,000 out of a total population of almost 40,000,000. 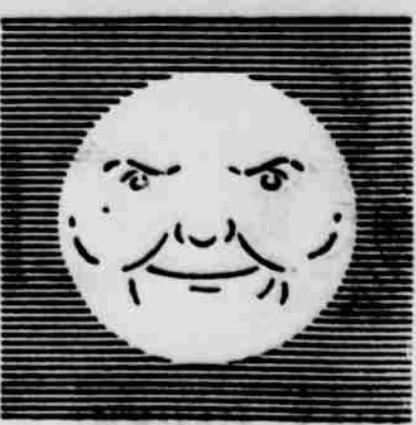
