"Fanchon" tonight. The thermometer ranges in the fifties every day.

Mr. Hal French has bought out Mr. Malcolm Jameson in the real estate business.

Edw. F. Terry, the motorman of the Itza, was released from jail last evening at 9:30 o'clock, the bonds of \$2,000 having been furnished.

The Wasco county luminary is extinguished. Its genial rays are no more, and the cockroach plays tag around the paste pot, with the scissors for sole spectator.

Mr. A. Bettingen is doing a good work in front of his property on Second street by removing the mud and putting rock in its place. He intends to practically demonstrate the value of a good piece of road.

Mr. Hal French, who is associated with Mr. J. M. Huntington in the real estate business, has fitted up their office in an elegant manner, and to give it an important touch it is connected with the Western Union Telegraph system.

James Wedie plead guilty of larceny before Justice Schutz yesterday. John Erier, his partner, plead not guilty, and Wedie appeared against him as a witness. As a result he was bound over under \$750 bonds to appear before the grand jury.

Sheriff Woolery of Seattle arrested Ed Henderson on the 8th inst., on a telegram from The Dalles, Or., where he is wanted for an assault with a deadly

weapon. He will be held till Sheriff T. A. Ward, of Wasco county, arrives with the requisition papers.

There is little land in Hood River valley but what is well suited to apple growing. Mr. Geo. Triplov is planning to shortly put out ten to fifteen acres to standard winter apples on his place on the side of Dead Point mountain, just west of the forks of Hood River.

A petition has been forwarded from Wasco, Sherman county, for a military company at that place, which will bear the letter A. It has not yet been heard from, but the request will doubtless be granted. The uniforms have been ordered and are expected to arrive at any time.

From a private dispatch we learn that Whitney Boise, chairman of the state republican committee, was arrested today in Portland. The present session of court is striking the high places, and our people can no longer be surprised. Justice is pressing the thumb screws with a vengeance in the metropolis.

Henry Reis, working for Mr. A. Buchler, fell from a haymow this morning about seven feet, sustaining a severe circular cut around the arm, near the shoulder. Dr. Hollister was hastily summoned, who took eighteen stitches in the dismembered flesh, and the wounded member will recover in due course of time.

**A Picturesque Bridge.**

Messrs. Triplov and Winans of Winans propose to construct a bridge across the west fork of Hood River, which will make that stream at that point of Tyrolean beauty. Two cliffs wall the stream here, upon which twin abutments will be built. The span will be 150 feet across and 90 feet to the water.

From this point to the junction of the forks the water seethes and boils in powerful cascades. The setting of basaltic rocks which line these streams, the stately pine trees, and the grand mountains near at hand, make a scene worthy of a grand artist.

**Forepaugh's Sharp Practice.**

The financial abilities of Adam Forepaugh were great, if we are to believe Mr. Stutz, who relates a very good story on that enterprising circus manager. He said that in Canada there was a duty of 7 cents a pound on all show paper printed outside of its borders for use in Canada, and 20 per cent. of the bill additional, making nearly 9 cents a pound. The bill provided that all goods uncalled for should be sold at public auction after two years. Forepaugh desiring to play in Canada after a two years' run in the United States, sent \$10,000 worth of paper to the bonded warehouse there—several carloads of it. In two years when it was to be sold, no one wanted this useless paper and a party bought it for \$100 to fill a hole in his land. The next session of the legislature increased the time to ten years, but Adam had all the show paper he wanted in Canada and billed the realm for nothing.

**RELIGIOUS NOTES.**

REV. DR. SOLOMON SCHINDLER, for nearly twenty years rabbi of Temple Adath Israel, the wealthiest Jewish congregation in Boston, will cease his ministrations there next May.

VERY REV. EDWARD S. SOBIN, superior general of the Order of the Holy Cross and founder of the University of Notre Dame, died recently at South Bend, Ind., aged seventy-nine years.

The people of the Samoan islands have not only supported the churches and ministers in their own islands, but last year they sent nine thousand dollars to London to help to send the Gospel to other lands.

On October 24 the old home at Washington, D. C., of Senator Douglas and later of Justice Bradley, was purchased as a residence for Mgr. Satolli. It is a commodious and elegant dwelling.

SAYS Sir Monier Williams in his "Buddhism": "Christianity demands the suppression of selfishness; Buddha demands the suppression of self. In the one the true self is elevated; in the other it is annihilated."

It is said that the Jewish synagogue at Moscow, which cost forty thousand pounds sterling, has been closed by the government. The Jews are deprived of it, and it is to be turned to "charitable uses." It was only completed last year.
