Miss Frank is the Prophetess Deborah's Able Successor.

Remarkable Learning and Piety of a Pretty California Girl—Offered the Opening Prayer at the Congress of Religions.

Persons who attended the congress of religions in Chicago in August will recall the interest with which they listened to the opening prayer, offered, as it was, by a young woman, and rich, as it was, in fervid, impassioned utterances.

Miss Rachel, or Miss Ray Frank, as she is oftenest called, is a native of California, and to her is to be accorded the distinction of becoming the first woman rabbi in the world.

"She is the first woman student in the college, and will be the first to be ordained as a rabbi. There is absolutely no precedent in this country or in any other, as no woman before has occupied the position of rabbi.
