It is claimed that the business depression of the past summer has cost the mill operatives of Lowell alone some half million dollars, owing to shutdowns.

Three routes for a cable line to the Sandwich Islands have been surveyed, and each is said to be practicable. With a cable to Honolulu a good start is made to lay it entirely across the Pacific.

The tariff question predominates even the Hawaiian imbroglio. A re-imposition of the duty on sugar, amounting to three-quarters of a cent, is one of the revisions of the Wilson tariff bill which may yet be made. The opposition to an increased whisky tax is so great and the difficulties surrounding such increase so numerous, that it is not likely any part of the deficit caused by the reduction in rates will be met from that source.

The Pacific Farmer says: Hon. Binger Hermann has written Secretary Sargent to know something about the pruned statistics of this state and how the growers feel about the proposed reduction of the tariff on prunes, so that he will know how to act when the bill comes up for consideration. He has no authentic statistics of the industry and it is a hard job to get any. Although Mr. Sargent has sent out in connection with the weather bureau thousands of slips, the growers appear to give little thought of their own welfare and they utterly ignore them. Only one place, and that the progressive Newberg, has responded so satisfactorily figures can be made. This place has at least 1,500 acres in fruit. This is a subject that demands immediate attention and every fruit grower should send in without delay all the information obtainable. From the slowness displayed by the large majority of the growers we are led to believe that they do not care if their business is ruined or not.

TAKE FIRST PLACE.

MICHIGAN is first in copper, salt and lumber, second in iron, third in sheep, fifth in hops, sixth in wheat.

ILLINOIS is first in corn, oats, pork, distilled liquors and railways; second in coal, wheat and hogs; third in cattle.

CALIFORNIA stands first in gold and grapes; second in sheep and wool; in hops, third; in wheat, fifth; in silver, eighth.

IOWA is first in hogs, second in corn, hay and oats, third in horses and mules, fifth in railways, seventh in wheat and coal.

OHIO is first in sheep and wool, second in petroleum and steel, fourth in wheat, sheep, coal and liquors, fifth in cows, hay and tobacco.

PENNSYLVANIA is first in rye, iron, steel, petroleum and coal, second in buckwheat and potatoes, fourth in oats, fifth in silk and wool, sixth in salt and copper.

NEW YORK is first in manufactures, printing, hops, hay, potatoes, buckwheat and cows, second in salt, liquors and railways, third in iron and steel, fourth in sheep.
