In the name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint of plaintiff filed against you in the above entitled Court and cause, on or before the first day of the next regular term of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Wasco county, next following the final publication of this summons, to-wit: on or before Monday, the 12th day of February, 1894; and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in his complaint, to-wit:
