

General Williams Taken Prisoner and Killed.

FOREIGN PRESIDENTS ARE SCARED

Rumor That There Has Been Bloodshed in Hawaii---Foreign and

Managua, Nicaragua, Jan. 8 .- General Williams, who was taken prisoner when the town of Choletuca, in Honduras was captured, January 4th, by Bonilla's troops, tried to escape yesterday and was killed by a sentinel. General Oritz has sent a body of troops to capture Amapala, a port of entry of Honduras on the Pacific coast. Foreign residents here have asked the United States minister that the warship Ranger, now at Corinto, Nicaragua, may go to Amapala at once to protect their interests.

President Dole replied the following day, repudiating the authority of the United States or any other nation to interfere with the provisional government and refusing to surrender the administration.
