AGAIN VICTORIOUS

Mello Destroyed Government Forts on the Islands.

INFLICTED CONSIDERABLE LOSS

Peixoto Will Drop Dynamite Bombs From a Balloon---Report of Resignation Denied.

RIO JANEIRO (via Montevideo), Jan. II.-A letter received in this city says Mello was near Desterro with the Aquidaban engaged in fitting out steamers to convey troops to Rio, and it was expected he would sail north January 5th. It is reported the insurgent forces destroyed the government forts on Eugenho island, and inflicted considerable loss to government forces. It is rumored he captured three field pieces on Moncangue island. The insurgents subsequently retired from both islands.

Peixoto's Dynamite Balloon.

Montevidio, Jan. 11 .- Your corresnondent in Rio sends word that the dirigible balloon which President Perxoto ordered constructed for use in the campaign is almost completed. It differs from other war balloons in having an electric motor. This balloon is made of silk, in spherical form, so that its equipoise is constantly maintained. No metal other than aluminum is used in its construction. Dynamite bombs will be dropped from the balloon on the rebel fleet. A messenger from Admiral DeGama carrying a note to Admiral Mello has been arrested in Rio.

Vaillant Taken to Prison.

PARIS, Jan. 11 .- Vaillant, the anarchist, sentenced to death yesterday, was taken today to the prison of LaRaquette, where it is expected he will be executed within the prison walls, not in public as is customary. If Vaillant continues to appeal to the court of cessation he will be executed in about 10 days. An effort will be made to secure his pardon.

ENGLISH COMMENT ON THE VERDICT. Lendon, Jan. 11 .- The Pall Mall Gazette, commenting on the Vaillant verdict, says it is significant of the flabbiness of the times that people should praise the jury's courage in rendering a verdict against Vaillant, who confessed and boasted of his crime.

The Westminster Gazette says Vailladt is a specimen of the modern type of literate criminal. His career is the result of criminal instinct. Education does not eradicate the taint.

One Language Will Do Now. CHATTANOOGA, Ga., Jan. 11.—Charles Oscar Keller was yesterday sentenced to seven years in prison for absconding with \$2700 agency funds of the Chattanooga Brewing Company.
