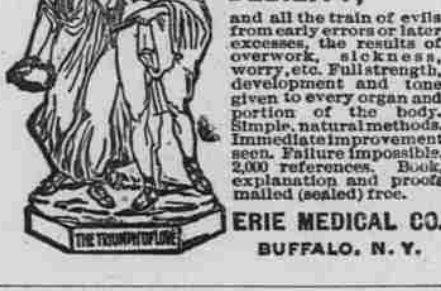

To Augustus Bunnell and Mrs. D. E. Price, of the above-named defendants:

In the name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby notified and required to appear and answer the complaint of plaintiffs filed herein against you in the above entitled cause and Court on or before the first day of the next regular term of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Wasco county, next following the final publication of this summons, to-wit: on or before Monday, the 12th day of February, 1894, and if you fail so to answer, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in their complaint, to-wit:

For a decree of foreclosure of that certain mortgage deed made and executed by the defendant, Augustus Bunnell, to the above named plaintiffs on the 19th day of October, 1888, upon the following estate, to-wit: The southeast quarter of section one (1) South, of Range twelve (12) East, of the Willamette Meridian, and being the same property conveyed by E. W.
