The total wool product of the United States is placed at 364,152,666 pounds during 1893, against 333,018,405 pounds for 1892, an increase of over 31,000,000 pounds. The American product of wool is estimated to have increased three fold during the past thirty years, with Australfa ten fold, South America nine fold and the British possessions in South Africa, five fold during the same time.

The issue of standard dollars from the mints and treasury office for the week ended February 3, 1894, was \$193,825; for the corresponding period last year it was \$283,112. Shipments of fractional silver coins for January, 1894, were \$363,632; for the corresponding period last year, \$478,136. And still the democrats persist in saying that the republicons kept all the silver in the vaults or in bullion.




