The story has been circulated that Secretary of State Gresham, immediately after his appointment to his present position, gave notice that he would no longer accept the pension he has been drawing since the war. The reason was stated to be that he wished to have his acts harmonize with the anti-pension views of the administration of which he is a member. Now comes an emphatic refutation of the story. The second deputy commissioner of pensions, Mr. Bell, states positively that Gresham does not intend to release his pension, nor refund any pension money that he has drawn. "He considers it an honor to be an honor to be rewarded by his government for a wound received while fighting in its defense," concluded Mr. Bell. So it thus appears that the reports concerning his giving up his pension are a bit of demagogic clap-trap, intended to harmonize him with the mossback antipension democrats.
