SAVED BY A RAT.

Thrilling Experience in a Caving Arizona Mine.

NAPOLEON WAS IN SING SING.

Locked Up by a Koeper White on a Visit of Inspection in 1837.

It is not generally known to the world at large, says the New York Times, that Emperor Napoleon III. of France was once behind the bars in Sing Sing prison. In the spring of 1837 Prince Louis Napoleon, afterward Napoleon III., emperor of France, made a visit to Washington Irving at Sunnyside, a little north of Irvington-on-the-Hudson, accompanied by a young French count, and escorted by Anthony Constant, of Hastings.

Then all followed the warden down the stairs and across the keyroom and the narrow passages to the galleries, where the cells were and are to this day. He paused at the second cell on the right hand tier of the main galleries and unlocked and opened the door. Louis Napoleon stepped inside. The warden, with a merry twinkle in his eye, turned the key and locked him in. It was too good an opportunity to be lost.
