

The Wilson bill is cunningly devised to make the North bear the expenses of running the government. Is not the country in the keeping of the same men who conspired to destroy the Union in 1861?

The present state law making taxes definquent April 1st is a stupid one, and it is high time it was changed. December 1st would be the best date, when money is always more plentiful. If a person over has any money it is then. The crops have been garnered and the payment for same has *been received. All kinds of obligations generally are squared up by this date, if they ever will be. Of the early spring months the adverse is true. These are borrowing months. The cash assets of nearly everyone have dwindled down to to nothing and money is tight. It is the worst time in the year for such a heavy draw as taxes. The next session of the legislature should amend this law. And in this connection they should at the same time provide that assessors be appointed by the county courts. This is too important a matter to be left to chance. There is no other county office which requires such peculiar characteristics on the part of the incumbent as county assessor. A good assessor is never popular-he is too inquisitive, too prying. A convention may put up a brainy man and a popular, but he may make a very poor assessor. The county court, recognizing who would be most valuable for this duty, and wishing to make the best administration possible, would make a better choice than any convention.


