INTERNATIONAL BIMETALISM.

The calling of another international moaetary conference is among the near possibilites. Germany and England are suffering from severe business depresmone, as indeed is all Europe, and the civilized or semi-civilized nations of Asia. Mr. George Rutledge Gibson, of the banking firm of Watson & Gibson, has returned to New York after a threemonths trip abroad, and gives his opinion, which is certainly entitled to respect, of the money situation. We quote a few paragraphs from an article by him pertaining to the subject as follows:

"Deficits exist in every European treasury and new issues of government securities are brought out to make both ends meet, and on account of the small profits of trade and small incentives to any sort of commercial industry, the idle surplus capital of the public readily seeks the new issues of securities of a national and municipal character. The most striking instance, perhaps, of this was the city of Paris 21g per cent loan, brought out about two months ago which was subscribed for eighty-five times over. Within the last fortnight the Ottoman loan of 80,000 bonds brought out subscriptions of 10,713,000 bonds. The subscriber of one bond got it, under thd European plan for supplying small investors first, but the subscriber for 1000 bonds got only six. This loan is not especially attractive, but the entire absence of all temptation or opportunity to invest in commercial enterprises forces this idle capital into these public securities.

"There is no parity of exchange between London and India; no means of translating with perfect certainty the language of the gold pound of Great Britain into the rupee of India, the tael of China, the paper money of the Argentime Republic, the silver dollar of Mexseo, the lire of Italy, or the peseta of Spain, and therefore trade is hampered and long contracts are a gamble of the most hazardous description.

"This break in the parity of exchange between the gold standard of Europe trees, whose trade Europe solicits, canmetals. England being one of the great- care. est international commercial freaty nations in the world, is really the most deeply interested in the restoration of some parity, whatever it may be, between gold and silver.

"Germany is a rival of England in seeking trade with silver using countries, and this foreign trading interest of Germany, acting in union with the de- In my mules and horses, I give Simmons B. F. This in the nation which 20 years ago was a demonetizer of silver, and which as lately as the International Monetary conference in Brussels, only a little over a year ago, instructed its delegates to listen to the arguments, but to express mo opinion, and thereby gave no aid to the cause of bimetalism.

"The most hopeful political sign that international bimetalism may yet be secured is the fact that constantly conwerts are being made in London to the overwhelming necessity of some such movements to restore the parity of exchanges between commercial nations. Mr. Balfour, too, the leader of the conservative party in parliament and the mephew of Lord Salisbury, is one of the most ardent advocates of the enormous importance of action in the matter of an international agreement, and the liberal party, holding office now by a slender majority of fourteen is showing signs of political dissolution."

Mr. Gibson seemed to think there was little doubt that with the return to power of the Salisbury regime England would readily agree to international bimetalism.
