OFFICE OF CITY COUNCIL, LONG CREEK, OR., June 4, 1894. TO THE CITIZENS OF THE DALLES: "Sunday, June 3d, Grant county was visited by one of the most destructive cyclones that was ever known in Oregon, and unfortunately Long Creek was in its course.

"The citizens of this place have subscribed liberally for the care of the homeless and wounded, but unless assistance can be obtained from neighboring towns, some of our people will suffer. Any amount that is contributed by your city will be added to the relief fund and expended for the benefit of the needy.
