How Russians Destroy Rats.

The following is said to be the Russian method of destroying rats, and as it appears to be an effectual one those who are annoyed with these animals are recommended to try it. Catch in a wire trap fifteen or twenty large rats (feed them in an extra trap or wire cage until you have the required number); then cease to feed them. They will soon become ferocious and fight, kill and feed upon one another. When only six or eight remain, turn them loose. Accustomed to feed upon their species they will hunt and destroy numbers.


