BATTLE AT SACRAMENTO

LIABLE TO OCCUR TODAY, OR AT LEAST TOMORROW.

Debs Says the Strike Will Reach all Trades and that it Will Culminate Tomorrow.

It Will Reach all Trades. CHICAGO, July 10.—[Special to THE CHRONICLE.]—President Debs in an address to his men today, says: "The industries of Chicago will be completely tied up tomorrow. This trouble has gone beyond the control of the American Railway Union, or of any other organization."

Bridge Burned at Ellensburg. ELLENSBURG, July 10.—One span of Northern Pacific bridge across Yakima river, seven miles north of here, burned early this morning. No particulars obtainable. A force is now at work repairing damages.

Troops for Sacramento. SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—The steamer Alameda, carrying two troops of cavalry and five companies of artillery started for Sacramento at noon today.

A Leader Arrested. MILWAUKEE, July 10.—President Frank Archibald, of the local railway union, was arrested today.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The final effort to reconcile the differences between the senate and house on the tariff will be made tomorrow. The democratic conferees will meet at noon in the finance committee room.

The Union Pacific. OGDEN, July 8.—The situation is rapidly clearing. This morning eight companies of regulars from Fort Douglas, under command of Captain Palmer, numbering 450 men, reached here on a special Union Pacific train.

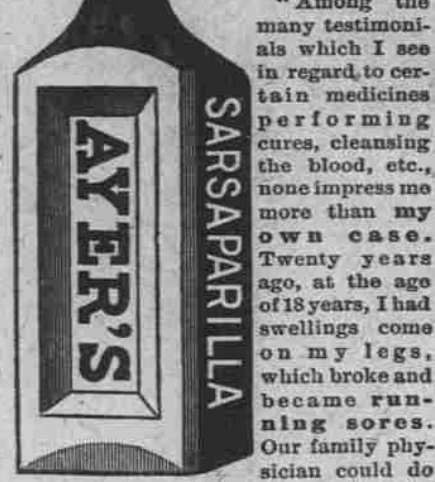
