A LYING HISTORIAN.

We have recently read, with mingled feelings of amusement and indignation, Hubert Howe Bancroft's History of Utah, a charming sketch, viewed as a of his fair one parading down the street literary effort, but as unreliable as a democratic senate. Mr. Bancroft finds his inspiration in the coin of the realm, and this fact is so patent in his Utah that it needs not even the assertion. The history of Utah was written from a Mormon standpoint, was paid for by Mormon money, is filled with fawning praise of Mormons, Mormon institutions, and Brigham Young in particular. It criticises severely General Johnston and all others representing the U. S. government, who individually and collectively, according to Hubert Howe Bancroft, were viltains and scoundrels.

They ought to reach some agreement soon, if they reach it at all, which we do not believe they will do.
