TO ADMIT UTAH.

A bill providing for the admission of Utah as a state has passed both houses of congress, and was in all probability signed by the president yesterday.

The conference committee are not making any headway and the prospects for any agreement between the senate and the house are decidedly slim.

Cholera is again raging in Russia, as high as 270 cases being reported in St. Petersburg in one day. The balance of Europe is quarantining strictly against it, and it is expected it can be kept within bounds.

Aberdeen Short on Beer.

ABERDEEN, July 14.—The tug Traveler arrived yesterday from Astoria, where she was sent after a cargo of beer, a famine of that article being feared.

LONDON, July 15.—A dispatch to the Standard states that the North German Gazette, commenting upon British mediation in the Chinese-Japanese dispute, says such a dictation does not mean a settlement.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.—There were reported in this city yesterday 218 new cases of cholera and 69 deaths.
