#### A GOOD LAW.

That the salary law adopted by the last legislature is a good one and will result in a great saving to the county cannot be doubted. The clerk's office will be self-supporting, saving at least \$3000 a year to the county, and the sheriff's office, while perhaps making some drain on the county treasury, will cost from \$1000 to \$2000 less per year. There was one mistake in the law and that was that the salary of the assessor was not raised. The assessor of this county should receive not less than \$2000 per year, for he is put to considerable expense, and we believe that the payment of this sum would be an actual saving to the county. Under the present law, the assessor cannot afford to make as thorough and close a canvass of the county as he should, and in consequence considerable property escapes taxation. It is the most difficult office in the county to fill, requiring more tact, judgment and energy than any other, and the pay should be commensurate with the work. Our legislators will do well to remember this fact, and have a bill passed paying the assessor a salary that will make it an object to retain the office.
