

Chemistry seems to furnish substitutes for the expensive perfumes now made from flowers. It has long been known that the exact odor of the banana is produced in the laboratory. There seems a possibility, however, that even when some fragrant plants cease to be cultivated for the perfumes many may become of importance in surgery. It has been discovered that some such plants are free from the attacks of insects and from fungous growths, and this may be due to the fact that their essential oils have antiseptic properties. 



### National Wealth of Europe

Holland still enjoys the distinction of being the richest country in Europe. The national wealth of England per capita is \$4,026, France, \$5,300, and of the 25 cent size had been used, a Holland. \$12,500. The average incomes per head are given as follows: England, \$200; France, \$265, and Holland, so25. With one-tenth the population of England, Holland has one-fourth as unch aggregate wealth, and with oneeleventh of the population of France, Holland has nearly one-third as much wealth. On an area of one-quarter of Iowa Holland sustains 3,750,000 of peoplc and wealth in the aggregate of \$47,500,000,000.






