NAME-STONES FROM HEAVEN. A Strange Superstition of the Moham-

The Mohammedans speak of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah as "the falling of the red-hot namestones." They say that when Lot had made a dead failure of his attempt to convert the Sodomites, God sent Gabriel and two other angels to destroy them. Gabriel was directed to-creep under the foundations of the wicked cities, and then, by suddenly straightening his form, lift the cities high in the air and let them fall to the earth in ruins. After this great overthrow, so the Koran says, "God showered down upon them hot, burning stones, baked in furnaces of heil. * * * On each stone the name of some guilty one was written, and on him it fell.
