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

SELECT THE SEED.

The following from the pen of Prof. tury a professor in the weather bureau. will no doubt be found of value, or at least give germs of thought to the reader. The ideas advanced by Prof. Abbe were brought from him in respone to a letter concerning the rainmakers who have been operating in the central Mississippi valley this season :

"Money should not be wasted on the rainmakers, but spent on wells, ditches, reservoirs, irrigation, windmills, and in other useful ways. An artificial pond and a grove of trees encircling it to break the wind would save more water than the rainmakers can ever hope to bring down.

"The effect of a dry season is to perfect seed that will prosper in a similar The seed taken from the South and healthy action. planted in the North gives a late variety, and vice versa. The seed carried from moist to dry climates does poorly at first, but eventually a variety is evolved suited to the new climate. Thus the grains of Europe are gradually adapting themselves to the climate of our most arid regions, just as they have cleanse the stomach, restore healthy done in southern Russia.

"Each farmer does something to presaving for next year's seed that which give speedy relief. ripened first in the dryest part of his farm. This is a lesson that I have boys at the university, and their gridlearned from my study of climates and iron is covered with white uniforms after crops.
