IN BLOOD AN INCH DEEP.

This is a story of a great sea fight, the first of the war in the Orient. It comes straight from the lips of one who saw with his own eyes the tragic events of which he tells, and had, himself, a part in this remarkable duel of the sea.

The engineer tells, as preliminary to his story, how the Yang Wei was ordered Chemulpo and there met the Japanese to fleet of seven vessels. The commander of the Yang Wei was ordered to watch the Japanese fleet, and when the latter put out to sea, the Yang Wei followed.

The Yang Wei is an unarmored steel cruiser of 1350 tons displacement, and was built in 1881 in England, at a cost of \$1,000,000. Her length is 210 feet, and her speed 16 knots.

"We continued our speed and drew the Japanese admiral on, until we had the Matsushima out of sight of the rest of the fleet. We had run about forty miles in the chase with the admiral's flagship, when word was passed to again stand for action.

"The Japanese could not work one of their guns. The shower of bullets that the Yang Wei poured into the port-holes of the other vessel rendered it impossible for her gun crews to stay at their posts.

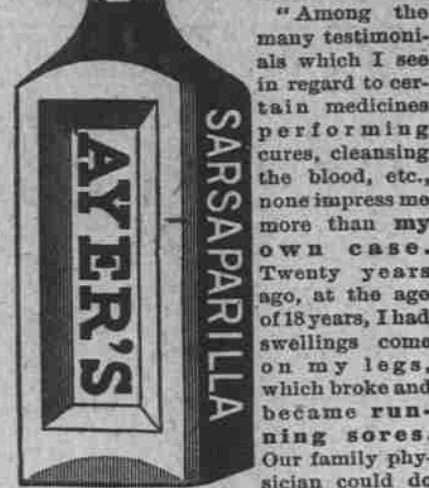
