The explosion took out our port after-gun and killed two of the gun's crew. The shot also took out our mainmast and ripped off the whole of the port after-end of the upper deck. The effect of the explosion downward was to completely wreck the deck. A jagged hole, fourteen feet in diameter, was left in the deck. Broken timbers, bent deck beams, torn steel plates and mangled human bodies were piled up on all sides. It was a sight to remember for a lifetime."
