A PIONEER GONE.

Ex-Governor Chadwick died at Salem Tuesday evening of heart failure. He was at the time in apparently the best of health and was at the dinner table when the summons came. He was born in Middletown, Connecticut, Dec. 25, 1825, and came to the Pacific coast in 1857, Ex-Gov. Moody coming in the same ship. He was member of the constitutional convention and has been prominently identified with the political history of Oregon for nearly forty years.


