SPRECKLES ON HAWAII.

Claus Spreckles, the San Francisco sugar king, knows most of the situation in Hawaii, and talks sensibly concerning that country.

"When I first began to consider the situation in the Hawaiian islands, I looked over the ground carefully. My idea then was that a republic should be created, the people to choose their president and vice-president, and to vote on the new constitution.

"Look sensibly at what we would get and give by annexation. We could not annex the country without taking in the people who are in its territory. There are from 12,000 to 15,000 Chinese, from 15,000 to 18,000 Japanese and 40,000 or more half-castes.

The senatorial fight in Oregon is practically settled, and Senator Dolph will represent the state of Oregon for six more years. It is well that the matter is settled without a tedious deadlock.
