GUATEMALA VS. MEXICO.

The first republic of Central America is seeking to pick a quarrel with Mexico. Guatemala would have as much show in a contest with Mexico as a mouse would have with a cat.

A comparison of the relative strength of Mexico and Central America will not be amiss at this time.

Mexico has a population of 11,632,924. Her army and navy is made up as follows: Infantry, 22,964; engineers, 766; artillery, 2,304; cavalry, 8,454; rural guards of police, 2,365; gendarmery, 250; total, 37,103 men.

Guatemala has a population not to exceed 1,500,000. The army is supposed to consist of 50,000 men.

The population of the remaining four republics of Central America is 1,604,291, which added to the population of Guatemala gives a total population of 3,104,291.

The fighting strength of the Central America republics is about 85,000 men; but these men are poor fighters when brought in opposition to well drilled troops.

We have stated that Mexico's army numbers 40,103 men. This is her army on a peace footing.

Thus we see that Mexico has an army almost double the size of that of the republics of Central America and more than three times that of Guatemala.

Guatemala is building somewhat on assistance from Spain. The republic of Guatemala evidently forgets that there is a doctrine in the United States known as the Monroe Doctrine.
