## A BAD BILL.

Senator McGinn of Multnomah has introduced a bill to create an official county newspaper in each county. The newspapers of the state are now in sharp competition with each other, and there is but few of the country papers that are more than paying expenses. This bill of McGinn's would bring such papers into sharper competition in the end would benefit no one, and would force the country press in self protection to bid for the work at rates below the cost of setting the type. It is unfair to the press and more than that unjust, for the law steps in and by making one paper the official paper assists in giving it patronage at the expense of all of its competitors.

If this bill is to pass, it would be better to have the county establish, struggle for the field one newspaper should not be assisted by the county as against another. To illustrate, suppose two newspapers of equal merit exist at any county seat. Bids are called for for doing the county printing. Now these papers must either enter into a combination to keep prices up, or they must bid for the work at losing rates rather than let the other have it, because if all the legal notices are published in one paper that paper will have a great advantage in soliciting subscriptions. In other words, the law steps in to assist the lowest bidder in running its competitor out of business. It ought not to pass.
