Washington, Feb. 4 .- Secretary Carlisle submitted a letter of information to the house over the adoption of the order, the senate today, which dissipates all Representative Hall denounced the enue to carry on the government. The

"Replying to the senate resolution of senate what is the estimated deficiency in the revenues of the government to pay current expenses between the 31st day of December, 1894, and the 31st day of December, 1895, and if the \$153,335,-579.99 cash balance in the treasury on the 31st day of December, 1894, will be sufficeint to meet such deficiency, I have the honor to state that from estimates made upon the basis of laws now in force, it is believed that for the 12 months ending December 31, 1895, the revenues of the government from all sources will evceed its ordinary expenditures by \$22,563,023. WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.-An amended labor arbitration bill was agreed on by the house committee on labor after conferences with representatives of locomotive engineers, trainmen, firemen and conductors had been reported to the house by Erdman.
