### To Remonetize Silver.

BELLIN, Feb. 15.—In the reichstag today, Count Mirbach urged the government to call an international monetary conference with a view to remonetizing silver. Count Bismark favored such a bill. Chancellor von Hohenlohe intimated that the government would be willing to confer with the federal government upon the question of entering into negotiations with other powers in regard to the advisability of considering the monetary system.

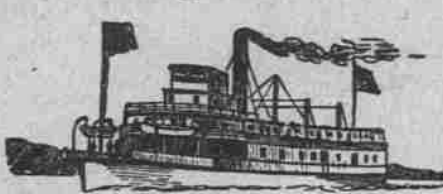
