OUR GOVERNORS.

A statement in THE CHRONICLE Tuesday that Lane was the first territorial governor of Oregon, brings from a reader the further statement just for the information of those who don't know, which is all who have not looked it up, that Abernethy was the first governor under the provisional government.

John Whitaker was elected at the time the constitution was adopted and was the first governor of the state, Gibbs followed in 1862; Woods in 1866; Grover in 1870, being re-elected in 1874, but being elected senator Chadwick became

governor, Thayer was elected in 1878, Moody in 1882, Penoyer in 1886 and Lord in 1894.

FREDERICK DOUGLASS DEAD.

Frederick Douglass, the well-known colored orator, died suddenly of heart disease at his residence in Anacostia, opposite Washington, at 7 o'clock last night.

Mr. Douglass had just completed his 78th year. After his many vicissitudes he died in seemingly excellent health, not many miles distant from the county on the eastern shore of Maryland, where he was born a slave in February, 1817.

He sat down and chatted with his wife about the women at the convention, telling various things that had been said and done. Suddenly he gasped, clapped his hand to his heart and fell back unconscious.

Douglass leaves two sons and a daughter, children of his first wife. His second wife, who was a white woman, survives him.

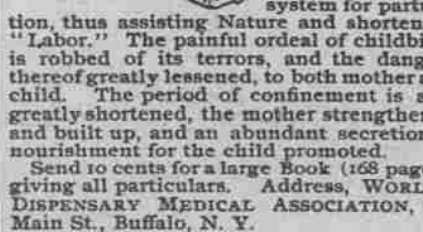

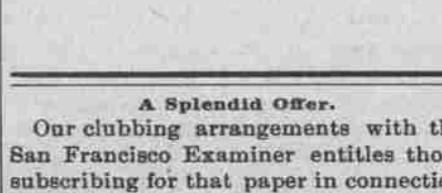
