One bond for a deed was filed for record today. It was from the Hood River Townsite Co. to Nick Billen, for lots 1 and 8, in block 4, town of Hood River.

A little girl, grandchild of A. D. Bolton of Boyd, fell from a wagon one day this week, and one of the wheels passed over her head, cutting a gash that required seven stitches to close.

The program for the concert at the M. E. church Wednesday night will be published Monday, and it is the best that has been given since The Dalles was favored with music by the Mozart Club.

A Seattle paper of late date give notice of the marriage of Miss Luella McFarland, formerly of this city, and Mr. L. E. Koontz of Tacoma. Miss McFarland has numerous friends in this city, whose best wishes will be extended to her.

Ellis' bill for the relief of settlers on railroad lands passed the house Wednesday, and a dispatch from Senator Mitchell last night announced that the bill had passed the senate. It provides that actual residence upon the land be not required.

Grant Bolton struck his hand with an ax while splitting wood one day this week, cutting it badly. He was holding a stick with one hand, while he used the ax with the other, and somehow when the ax got there the stick was gone and his hand wasn't.

Last night the wind got on a bit of a tear and had things all its own way for a while, probably, just to let us all know that March had come. March did not come in like a lion, but it acted like Henry McGinn when it found out it was a hold-over and that was worse than any coming in it might have.

Gates for the defense, and the battle was a spirited one. The jury retired to consider the case, but failed to agree, and so passed the night in the council chambers.
