The testimony showed that the men were working in a crib, placing rock therein. That a derrick was used for hoisting the tray containing the rock into the crib. Before the tray is hoisted the man in charge always blows a whistle, which is a call to the men in the crib to come out. Among those employed were John Hill and a man named Koskelo. When the whistle blowed at the time the accident occurred, Hill and Koskelo came out with the others, but instead of going behind the derrick with the others, and as Mr. Seufert had told them to do many times, they sat down on the edge of the crib.
