Oregon Weather Notes.

From Weather Observer Pague's report of the weather for the year 1894, we glean the following:

"The coldest place in Oregon, as shown by the mean temperature, is Burns, Harney county, with a mean of 37.3 degrees and as shown by the minimum temperature which is 32 degrees below zero. Bandon, in Coos county, had the lowest maximum temperature, viz: 78 degrees.

"The snowfall was unusually heavy during the year, the heaviest being at Hood River, in Wasco county, where the total amounted to 135.5 inches—over 11 feet. Joseph, Walla Walla county, had 61.5 inches; Baker City, 56.6 inches; along the coast there fell from 1 inch at Gardiner to 15 inches at Astoria; in the Willamette valley and in Southern Oregon from 4 to 29 inches fell. The greatest of all events occurring during the year—due to meteorological conditions—was the flood in the Columbia and tributary rivers. In June the rivers rose from 6 to 20 feet higher than ever before known, and did considerable damage.
