AN APOLOGY.

In commenting upon the report that the government official in charge of the work at the Cascades would recommend that the bulkhead be not removed until the walls of the canal were raised to the height of the flood of 1894, we used language concerning those officers which was entirely out of place, and of which we are heartily ashamed. Whatever may, or may not be reported or done in the premises, we realize the fact that the officers of the United States engineer department are highly educated and conscientious gentlemen. We are also cognizant of the fact that they have life positions, and consequently can have no personal interest in prolonging the work at the locks, since upon its completion they would be simply given some other station that would probably be much more pleasant.

We make this apology to them because we were in the wrong, and it is due both to them, and to ourself.

A FLYING STORY.

In Saturday's issue we perpetrated a harmless bit of pleasantry in the shape of an April fool story concerning Mr. Parrott's flying machine. Of course the story had many of the brands and earmarks of fiction, and we hardly supposed that it would deceive anybody. We had no intention of ridiculing Mr. Parrott's attempt to solve the problem of aerial navigation; on the contrary, we feel that the question will be answered properly sometime, and if Mr. Parrott has the motive power he claims so have, we believe he has made a long step towards the solution of the problem. We sincerely hope that when Mr. Parrott makes his trip it will be just as successful as it has in the fictitious trial we gave it.

Of one thing Mr. Parrott can feel assured, and that is that everybody in The Dalles knows he is making a flying machine, and will hereafter be interested in watching its development.

The train robbers are playing in hard luck recently, and the business will soon fall into decay if something is not done to put the highwaymen on better footing. The last two hold-ups have been severely fatal. In the one, out of six hold, bad men who held up the train, only three escaped, the others being pumped full of lead and remaining on the ground to await the action of the coroner. In the other there were but two robbers, and one of them was left in the car, the other getting away without any plunder. One-half of the two parties were killed, and this puts the calling among those classed as dangerous. If the record is kept up the business will soon be abandoned.

Governor Lord is probably right in the theory on which he bases his appointments, that is that all the talent and brains of the republican party that are not in Multnomah county are concentrated in Marion; but we respectfully suggest that all the republican votes do not come from these counties.
