Winter Spray for San Jose Scale and Curl Leaf of the Peach.

Lime, unslacked..... 30 lbs
Sulphur, powdered..... 20 lbs
Salt, Liverpool..... 15 lbs

The above is a very efficient remedy for the San Jose Scale and Curl Leaf of the Peach, and is an excellent fertilizer for the trees. It not only destroys the scale and prevents the spread of the curl leaf, but removes all lichens and keeps the bark soft.

In the case of curl leaf, the greatest good will result from the early spraying, as it prevents to a large degree the dormant spores of this parasitic fungus coming to life, and destroys any that may have started.

DIRECTIONS.

To be most successful, this spray should be applied just before the buds swell in the spring. It can be used at this time stronger than later, and should be thrown upon the trees when it is warm.
