BIDS FOR BONDS.

In accordance with an act of the legislature, Dalles City, Wasco County, Oregon, will issue bonds to an amount not to exceed sixty thousand and not less than fifty thousand dollars, each bond to be of the face value of five hundred dollars, payable twenty-five years from the date of issue, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum, interest payable semi-annually.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder for cash. Sealed proposals will be received for the purchase of the same at the recorder's office in said city from this date until 4 o'clock p. m. on the 15th day of April 1895.
