



Rock Creek Shooting Affray.

A telegram from Arlington yesterday says:

"A shooting affray took place between 5 and 6 o'clock this morning at the residence of Harry Clay, on Rock creek, twenty miles south of here, resulting in the death of Henry Grider. Henry had been working for Mr. Clay for about a year, and had been looked upon as a faithful, law-abiding citizen. Recently, however, Grider seems to have gained the impression that he owned the ranch, and was going to run things to suit himself. He had made threats of killing Mr. Clay, and had been carrying a revolver for some time. This morning the two men had some little dispute and, without provocation, Grider drew scenes. The proceeds of the play will be a revolver and fired two shots at Clay without effect.
