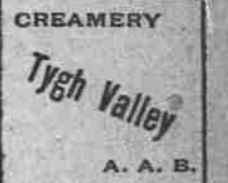

Sheriff Coombs of Cook came in yesterday bringing a prisoner who was sentenced at the recent term of court there, to one year in the pen, having been convicted of larceny.

Mr. Ad Edgar received a letter from a friend at Umatilla yesterday, stating among other things that 5000 horses had been sold by parties there to a company organized in Seattle for the purpose of canning horse flesh.

The Regulator gave the alarm and at once steamed over to the scow and began pumping water into her, and in a few minutes the fire brigade organized by the Day Bros. was on hand with their buckets, and the fire was soon under

control. It started from the donkey engine, live coals in some way dropping through the upper deck and starting the fire.

This morning Mr. Hanna coming in from Chenoweth creek discovered that someone had scattered saltpeter along the road, with the evident intention of destroying such sheep as should be driven over it.
