SECRATARY GRESHAM DEAD.

Secretary Gresham died in Washington, D. C., at 1:15 o'clock this morning, after an illness of about four weeks. That his illness was aggravated and his death hastened by the cares and annoyances of his office, there is little doubt. As a judge he won for himself an en-

wiable reputation, and by reason of his services upon the bench he came near winning the nomination for president. Disappointed in this, he left the party which had honored him and joined the party against which he sought the presidential nomination. For this service, rather than because of any peculiar fitness for the position, he was made secretary of state.

His warmest friends will scarcely claim that his administration has been a success. Petulant and exacting, he was illy qualified to fill the position which requires the most skilful diplomacy. Had death come to him while he continued to fill the position he was best fitted to fill-that of U.S. judgethe American people would feel far different toward him than they do. He was a man of great talent, but not as secretary of state.
