

Dalles Delegates at the Grand Lodge.

To THE EDITOR—Brothers Varney, Barnett and Merrill started on the early train from The Dalles on Tuesday morning for Forest Grove, where the grand lodge of our order is to hold its sessions.

Though leaving The Dalles we were fifteen minutes late, we arrived in Portland on time, and having plenty of leisure to purchase our tickets and obtain the necessary certificates for receiving the reduced rate, we took the Southern Pacific train for Forest Grove and were again on our way.

Arriving at Forest Grove, we were met by the reception committee and escorted to the I. O. G. T. hall, which seemed to us about two miles away. At the hall we were given the district degree, and after some more waiting the grand lodge was called to order by the grand chancellor, John Allwood, and when it was properly opened, we were marched into the lodge room and given the grand lodge degree.

There are now seventy-three delegates on the roll, besides the grand officers, and the session promises to be a very pleasant one.

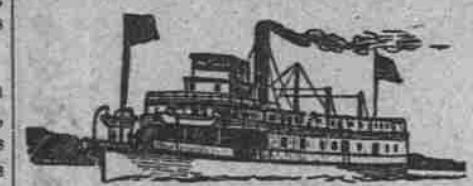
