

Sherman County Gossip.

EDITOR CHRONICLE:—It would be almost a breach of journalistic etiquette for a Sherman county correspondent to write up the items here without advertising to the perpetual wind we have experienced this spring. It "bloweth where it listeth," and that seems to be everywhere throughout the length and breadth of our county; but with the equanimity of the true philosopher, we feel like saying, in the language of the poet: "Let her blow, Gallagher." 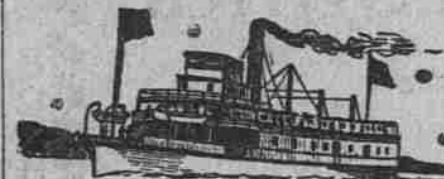
