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## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

**HAMBURG, June 20.**—The demeanor of the French admiral, Menard, and his officers toward Prince Henry of Prussia, was cordial, and left the best impression upon the German naval commander-in-chief.

It is understood that the joint entry of the French and Russian squadrons into Kiel harbor was arranged beforehand by telegraph. It has certainly been taken in the light of a demonstration which Russians declare to have been merely a coincidence. The Bismarckian organs attribute it to French intrigues.

The speech to be delivered by the emperor today has been drawn up by Prince Hehenlohe. It will be in the nature of a solemn consecration of a new era of peace.

It is reported that the authorities of the Kiel arsenal intend to dismiss a number of socialist workmen who fraternized with the sailors of the French fleet, though on private vessels.

The Weeser Zeitung publishes an alarmist article prophesying that the vessels passing through the canal will go around, that the banks will give away and that many other accidents will occur to mar the festivities.

### Train Robber Shot.

**REDDING, Cal., June 20.**—Thirty men were searching for the train-robber, Brady, in this vicinity yesterday. A fight between Brady and the officers occurred, when Brady received two gunshot wounds in his face. The brush near the scene of the battle was thick, and Brady probably was hiding. Constable Martin says when he started from Cottonwood he expected to locate Brady and then return to Redding for a posse, (Martin suddenly came upon Brady, who pulled a gun and Martin had to fight or allow Brady to escape.

Brady was last seen at Dawson's, by a colored man living 1 1/2 miles from the scene of the shooting. He walked quite lame. He had two shots in the right side of his face, and his right eye was swollen or gone. He asked for a drink and left. He had his shotgun with him.

### Nicaraguan Canal Commissioners.

**New York, June 20.**—A special to the World from Colon says:

The local newspapers say the Nicaraguan canal commissioners will probably come here to inspect the Panama canal before returning home, adding that their report will be of no value to the isthmus, and may seal the fate of either or both canals.

The Nicaraguan canal commissioners taken out by the Montgomery are expected to be returning to New York by way of Costa Rica, on an Atlas steamship.

### Alarming State of Affairs in Colombia—Almost Bankrupt.

**New York, June 20.**—A special to the World from Bogota says:

Government circles are much alarmed at the spread of the revolution. The rebel forces are increasing rapidly, and the government is having difficulty in meeting its obligations. The president is continually surrounded by guards. The greater part of the country is devastated by the former revolution and is not producing anything. It is claimed that the taxes on coffee prevent its cultivation.

### Indicted Bankers.

**DENVER, Col., June 20.**—F. K. Atkins, ex-president of the Colorado Savings bank, and Charles O. Atkins, ex-cashier, furnished bonds in \$3,000 each today to answer to indictments charging them with receiving deposits in the bank, that was insolvent and had closed its doors to regular business.

### The Canal Formally Opened

**HOLTENAU, June 20.**—The Hohenzollern reached the canal lock here at 12:40, the first vessel to formally pass through the canal, and it was greeted with vociferous cheers from the mass of spectators.

**KEIL, June 20.**—The weather today was magnificent and the greatest animation prevailed everywhere. At the earliest hour thousands were already en route to Holtenau and Levensalle, to await arrival of the imperial procession from Brunsbuttel. Special trains conveying representatives of the press arrived from Hamburg at 5 o'clock this morning. The shipping in the harbor was profusely decorated with bunting, and the port presented a very picturesque appearance. The stands on the neighboring heights were filled with sightseers and masses of people unable to obtain seats were grouped everywhere.
