There is a good | prospect for fruit in all sections, and the potato crop has withstood the dry weather surprisingly well. Fruit is making a rapid growth, and the early varieties of apples are ripe. Blackberries are ripe and plentiful in the market. Hood River peaches are also ripe. In Klamath and Harney counties the fruit will be of good quality, though not plentiful, owing to the work of the early frosts. Haying continues, and alfalfa is still being cut. The drouth has mater-ially lessened the yield of hay, and but for the fact that the season of 1894 pro-duced more than was required for consumption, consequently leaving much of last year's crop on hand, farmers would be at a loss for feed for their stock, which, unfortunately, is the case in many sections.
