The Steamboat Company Takes the Aggressive -- Transcontinental Schedule May Be Affected.

The railroad rates appear to be for the five-day train only. Friday the O. R. & N. Co. announced a reduction by steamer from \$15 to \$10 first-class, and from \$7.50 to \$5 second-class. The Southern Pacific yesterday morning reduced its train rate from \$20 to \$15, first-class, and from \$10 to \$7.50 second-class, partly to meet the cut by steamer.
