WILL NOT ARBITRATE

Salisbury's to Olney on Venezuelan Affair.

HIS REQUEST FLATLY REFUSED

It is Reported General Throughout Venezuela--Colombian Troops Defeated in an Attack on Alfaro's Forces.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The reply of the Marquis of Salisbury to the note of Secretary Olney on the Venezuelan question is on board the White-Star line steamship Britannic, due in New York Friday. The essence of the document is that Great Britain refuses to submit to arbitration any territory within the Schomburgk line. Some surprise is expressed because the reply was not sent through the United States embassy, but Ambassador Bayard explains that this is in accord with diplomatic usage.

COMMENT ON THE MESSAGE. Opinions, Favorable and Otherwise, in English Papers.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Referring to President Cleveland's message to congress, the St. James Gazette this afternoon says:

"There is nothing whatever of jingo in Cleveland's message. In spite of all assertions to the contrary there is not the least probability that the United States will put any obstacles in the way of a proper settlement of the Venezuelan question."

The Pall Mall Gazette says: "So far as our relations with America are concerned, the message is not likely to raise any unpleasant question, but we fall to see how Cleveland's definition of Monroeism applies to Venezuela."

The Globe says: "There is nothing surprising in the fact that the Monroe doctrine talks rather largely in the message, nor in the hostile tone adopted toward England. Is not the presidential election drawing nigh? Pulling the lion's tail may look to the old world a curious way of trying to catch fish, but it has been found to answer in the turbid waters of American politics."

A Terrible Storm Coming. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 4.—The weather

bureau has issued a warning of a severe storm which will sweep the coasts of California, Oregon and Washington, tomorrow. The storm will be especially severe north of Cape Mendocino and on Oregon and Washington coasts, and there will be danger to shipping. Rain will accompany the storm.

BATTLE EXPECTED SOON. Spanish Trying to Prevent Maceo's Entrance Into Santa Clara.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—A special to the World from Havana says: Maceo's advance columns moved rapidly across the country from the neighborhood of Casacaora and reached a point five miles from Clege de Avila on the evening of November 28. The main body was then between Horninguera and Socorro.

On the 29th a sound of firing was early heard at Clege de Avila in the direction of Fort Redonda, on the Trocha. At 10 o'clock Maceo's advance guard, 400 strong, attacked Fort Redonda and was repelled. His entire following then passed to the westward across the Trocha, between Forts Redonda and Sanchez, which are on the military line of Clege de Avila.

Four separate Spanish columns are in the vicinity of Maceo's force, endeavoring to prevent his entrance into Santa Clara, which is his present object. Suarez Valdez, with 4900 soldiers, and Navarro, with 3000, are in his front, and Mella and Aldave are in his rear and on his left flank, with 4500 men.

There is expectation in official circles here of an important engagement, and it is likely to occur at any moment. News from Santa Clara is looked for with intense interest.

HORSES FOR THE ARMY. The Usual Fall Supply to Be Purchased.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The army will soon begin to buy the usual fall supply of faultless horses for the cavalry and, accordingly, the secretary of war has sent Colonel James M. Moore, of New York, assistant quartermaster-general, and Captain James B. Aleshure, of St. Louis, assistant quartermaster, to Chicago, to make these purchases. After exhausting the Chicago market Colonel Moore will go to Des Moines and St. Louis. The buying of horses for the cavalry and artillery each year is of no small importance. The requirements are rigid, and not more than two horses out of every ten offered are suitable.
