Thought to Be Leaking -- If She Is Not Ready to Sail Wednesday the St. Louis Will Take Her Place.

SANDY HOOK, Jan. 26 .- The American liner St. Paul, from Southampton, for New York, struck the outer bar, off the Hotel Brighton, at Long Branch, N. J., during a dense fog, between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning. She was shortly afterwards discovered by the patrol from the Long Branch life-saving service, and preparations were made to open communication with her. The apparatus was dragged to the place and a shot was fired across the vessel, a hawser was placed on bcard and the breeches-buoy sent off. The people on board desired to remain by the vessel, as there was no danger. Messages were sent ashore notifying the agents of the maritime exchange and the wrecking companies of the accident.

Crews from Seabright, Monmouth Beach and the Long Branch life-saving stations were all in attendance on the steamer. The wind was light, southwest, with a long ground swell.




