Hope for Consumptives.

Dr. O. C. Hollister has been trying the aseptolin treatment for consumption on three patients residing in this city. This is the latest medical discovery, by Dr. Cyrus Edson, which has filled the medical journals of late, and has even taken much of the news space of our daily press. It is too recent a discovery to claim that it is a positive care for the dread disease, but it is noted that the distressing symptoms accompanying tuberculosis disappear soon after the treatment commences, provided the patient has not reached what is known as the third and last stage of consumption. In the cases under charge of Dr. Hollister, the night sweats and diarrhoa have ceased, and the cough has nearly disappeared. The aseptolin is a colorless liquid, used hypodermically, from twenty to sixty drops being injected in the abdomen. These local cases will be followed with interest, as they are the first so far as known to be treated with the newly-discovered medicine. If a cure can be effected, it should become apparent ten days hence.


