EDITOR CHRONICLE:

Your correspondent made a tour of Hood River valley during the last week and found things which may be of interest to the readers of THE CHRONICLE. The rains have brought the wheat

into fine condition and those pieces that seemed winter killed have come forward and now look very promising.

We are informed that the frosts of March and April did very little damage to the strawberries, but the cold weather will cause late ripening.

Much enterprise has been shown this spring in setting out fruit trees, and we have it estimated that from twenty-five to fifty thousand fruit trees of various kinds have been set out in the upper and lower valley this spring, making now not less than 150,000 trees, a large number of which are apple trees. 
